# Town Council hikes property taxes 3.94 per cent for 2020

Despite several councillors professing their dislike for higher taxes, it didn't stop them from approving Georgina's 2020 budget on December 4, which will see residents' property taxes increase by 3.94% next year — more than double the rate of inflation.

And, that's not the worst news.

Expect to see property tax increases for the foreseeable future, as Georgina embarks on the most significant capital spend in its history — with the MURC, a new Civic Centre, West Park, Sutton Community Park, the Link — Phase 2 & 3, and the South Keswick Fire Station all slated for construction over the next few years.

According to Mayor Margaret Quirk, the 2020 budget provides "value" to residents by finding a balance between investing in the community and minimizing the impact of tax increases in the long run.

That's being achieved by adding a one per cent capital reserve charge to the 2.94 per cent property tax levy to reach the total of 3.94 per cent — a practice that's intended to build up the town's capital reserves to avoid increasing the tax levy in future years.

"I think we can all agree that we want to make sure that the Town of Georgina has the right tools, the right technology,

### Grossi violates Town's Code of Conduct

Regional councillor Rob Grossi violated the town's code of conduct by not declaring a "conflict of interest" during a special council meeting held to deal with the divestiture of the town's lakeside lands on Lake Dr. East and North, according to a report filed by Deborah

Anschell, the town's integrity commissioner.

Specifically, Ms. Anschell states that Mr. Grossi violated sections of the Municipal Act that require town councillors to declare a pecuniary interest, direct or indirect, before taking part in discussions about, or voting



on, a matter before council.

Ms. Anschell states that Mr. Grossi failed to disclose his "pecuniary interest" at the outset of the July 24 special council a property on Lake Drive East, before engaging in discussions and voting on a motion that would financially impact property owners along Lake Drive.

Mr. Grossi then proposed a motion that would allow Lake Drive owners to acquire adjacent land in exchange for a pro-rata share of land survey and legal costs, a much cheaper option for them.

Although Mr. Grossi later withdrew that motion, he did vote on a final motion that council passed, directing the town to conduct appraisals to help it set an appropriate price for the Lake Drive property owners to acquire the adjacent land.

Regional "In my view, Councillor Grossi had a palpable and apparent conflict of interest that he should have declared at the Council Meeting," writes Ms. Anschell. "In fact, given Regional Councillor Grossi's vast experience on Town Council, I find it disturbing that he did not recognize the obvious conflict that arises from his pecuniary interest as a Lake Drive property owner."

According to the report, the original complaint was brought forward by Joanne Henderson, a local resident and administrator of the Facebook group page "OUR Town of Georgina."

The report states that in a written affidavit, Ms. Henderson says that "Regional Councillor Grossi did not declare a pecuniary interest at the Council Meeting." And, that "Regional Councillor Grossi actively led and participated in discussions throughout the Council Meeting. He also voted throughout the Council Meeting. "

The report also outlines Mr. Grossi's response to Ms. Henderson's complaint.

In his reply, Mr. Grossi argues meeting; he and his wife own that he has no pecuniary interest in these issues.

> He and his wife Carolyn Grossi purchased their Lake Drive East property on August 27, 1985. Since then, MPAC has assessed and taxed his property at a special rate, "as one fronting on a body of water." So, the Grossi family, and not the town, own the land to the water's edge.

> Moreover, Mr. Grossi also expressed the view that "the value of the Grossi property would not change if he paid for a survey, paid legal fees, and paid to acquire the lakefront abutting his land." In short, there is no pecuniary interest either way.

> This argument did not sway Ms. Anschell. While she acknowledges that it is beyond "my purview" to provide a legal opinion on the ownership of the lakeside lands across from the Grossi property, she asserts the land "may" be owned by the town. In which case, "Regional Councillor Grossi has a conflict. He may be directly impacted financially by any decisions of Council with respect to the Lake Drive issue."

# Editorial: Facebook politicking

Although Mr. Grossi should have declared a pecuniary interest before discussing the Lake Drive issue at council on July 24, it was widely known that he owned property on Lake Drive, which has been his principal residence since 1985.

This fact was known to the rest of council and, possibly, to most of Georgina. That's why nobody in the council chamber batted an eye when Mr. Grossi attempted to help resolve a thorny issue that's pitted the town against Lake Drive residents.

That is except for Joanne Henderson, who is the unofficial cheerleader for Mayor Margaret Quirk and select members of council.

Ms. Henderson is the administrator of a Facebook group called "OUR Town of Georgina," on which members post comments about council, local news, or whatever is sticking in their craw.

For most people, it's a place to let off some steam, but for Ms. Henderson it's a vehicle to promote her views, which align a little too closely with the Mayor's.

Case in point, this May, she posted an extensive criticism of Mr. Grossi's opposition to the MURC. "In my opinion, it appeared he did not understand the funding mechanisms," she wrote. Remember, she's talking

about someone who has served five terms as Mayor and three years as a local councillor.

Ms. Henderson has also used her position to launch digs at this publication — most recently for printing a correction to a Letter to the Editor, while she conveniently ignored a serious error of fact committed by the Advocate.

Now, Ms. Henderson, not content with politicking on her own FB group, is venturing onto other FB groups to push her take on the Mayor and council apparently, they can do no wrong - and taunt people she disagrees

Most recently, she went on the Pefferlaw Facebook group to provoke a response from Karen Wolfe, who recently wrote a critical opinion piece about the town's draft budget.

In reference to Ms. Wolfe's demand for fiscal responsibility, Ms. Henderson wrote:

"Where should the town start cutting? Karen Wolfe lives on one of the roads to be resurfaced this year. Maybe start there?"

In short, she is not what she seems, a town booster, rather a cyberbully with a secret agenda. This begs the question: Is Ms. Henderson really a concerned citizen? Or was her complaint against Mr. Grossi politically motivated?



right buildings, processes and facilities for our residents. And, that we have the right financial plan to bring all that together," said Mayor Quirk before voting. "Tve said this in the past, failing to plan is planning to fail."

However, council didn't need much convincing with five out of six councillors approving an operating budget of more than \$77 million for 2020 — requiring a total tax levy of close to \$45 million and water and sewage rates of over \$15 million.

Council also approved capital expenditures of more than \$67 million in 2020 — for a total spend of more than \$146 million.

The ten-year capital forecast is now \$286 million, up more than \$10 million from last year's forecast of \$275 million, much of which will be financed through long-term debt.

The 2020 property tax increase roughly translates into a \$79 up-charge for a single-family detached dwelling assessed at just over \$400,000. The increase in water and wastewater rates could add a further \$24 to your bill.

All this runs counter to the sentiments expressed in the town's online budget survey, which indicated that more than 65 per cent of residents wanted either a zero or modest one per cent tax increase.

The only dissenting opinion was offered by Regional Councillor Rob Grossi, who said he couldn't in good conscience support the budget increase.

"We don't know what the external pressures are going to be over the next couple of years," he said. "We simply can't afford a fourth library or a West Park. And when you're looking at the reality of what it's going to cost us, and the debt that we are going to have to finance — and it isn't just the next three years, it's the next 10 to 15 years. I'm not sure that the people of this

community can continue to afford to live here."

The vote on December 4 was proceeded by two days of budget review, where the intent was to find savings. But, there were no additional cuts made.

Instead, several councillors threatened to add to the budget with their suggestions for new capital projects. There were more than a dozen capital projects put forward for consideration — some with hefty price tags, including Councillor Frank Sebo's request for a Water Park Slide at the ROC for "several million dollars," which was deferred for further review.

But others, like Councillor Mike Waddington's request for safety equipment for storm water ponds that kids are using as impromptu skating rinks and the Mayor's request for a wheelchair swing for De La Salle Park were approved, although they will be funded from reserves and not added to this year's tax levy.

Despite the town's propensity to spend rather than cut, there were some positives to be found in the budget.

Funding for road repair and maintenance was maintained, although Rob Flindall, Director of Operations and Infrastructure, says the town needs to spend three times as much.

There is funding to develop a broadband strategy, which is urgently needed, with many residents and local businesses experiencing poor connectivity.

Previously neglected assets will also get some much-needed attention, including Pioneer Village, which has several buildings in urgent need of repair. And, finally, there is new funding for the maintenance of the town's parks, including hiring a full-time park employee — the last full-time hire for the parks department was more than ten years ago.

However, some important


things were left out of the budget.

is no additional funding to help attract potential employers to Georgina — even though 23 per cent of budget survey respondents, the largest segment, wanted their tax dollars spent on economic development and job growth.

There are also no new initiatives to promote Georgina as a tourist destination, other than additional funding for a

winter banner program for Woodbine Ave and Dalton Rd.

Residents can expect to see the 3.94% tax increase reflected in their 2020 property tax bill, which will be mailed out in January. The first installment will be due sometime in February. Late payments will incur a one per cent penalty. There is also a one per cent interest charge for amounts outstanding.

# Georgina avoids dark streets for the holidays.

It was a nip and tuck affair, but the town will have new LED holiday decorations up in time for Christmas after all.

But it's scaling back its initial plan to put up 54 of the holiday lights. That's because the cost of mounting them has skyrocketed 200 per cent.

After spending a \$70,000 grant on the new lights, the town discovered this fall that its hydro poles would need electrical upgrades new conduits and GFIs - for the lights to work.

Initially, the cost estimate was \$30,000 — about \$550 per pole. Based on that number, council approved the electrical upgrades after all, nobody wanted dark streets for the holidays.

But the clock was ticking. So, in the interests of expediency, the town waived competitive bids and awarded the work to two electrical contractors.

Now that decision is proving to be costly. The final bill may come in at \$90,000, according to Rob Flindall, the town's director of Operations and Infrastructure, who broke the bad news to council on Nov 27.

To stem the bleeding, council has halted the upgrades once the 35 poles are completed, asking staff to wait until January to tender the work for the remaining 19 poles, hoping a competitive bid process will bring in a lower price. That means the downtown areas of Keswick, Sutton, Jackson's Point and Pefferlaw will have to share 35 holiday lights between them.

Another company will install the new LED holiday decorations once the electrical work is complete and the 35 lights should be up by Dec 15. The remaining 19 lights will stay in their boxes until next year.





# Second train derailment in as many years may be due to speed

After a second CN freight train derailed in Pefferlaw in just over two years, Ward 5 Councillor Dave Harding says he's concerned the trains may be travelling too fast through the town.

"There are always issues when it comes to trains, the lengths of them, the weights they carry and their speeds," Mr. Harding said. "After the last train derailment two years ago, CN said that they were going to put the speed down. I've been in town myself and sitting there looking at the trains flying by. They're still doing the speed that they would do outside in the country."

The latest partial derailment, involving three tank cars, occurred on December 2,


After a second CN freight between Weir's Side Rd and ain derailed in Pefferlaw in Forestry Dr.

The tank cars came off the track but remained standing. However, it took CN crews with heavy machinery approximately 12 hours to clear the rails and move the damaged tank cars.

During this time, YRP closed Old Homestead Rd, between Weir Side Rd and Forestry Dr to local traffic only.

"There was no danger to public safety," said Jonathan Abecassis, a senior spokesperson for CN. "No one was injured, and there were no fires and no spills."

While the tank cars were empty, they did contain trace elements of a chemical product, according to Mr. Abecassis. However, he did not name the

chemical compound.

But Georgina Fire Chief Ron Jenkins later confirmed the tank cars contained trace elements of sulphuric acid, commonly known as battery acid.

According to the Canadian Centre of Occupational Safety, sulphuric acid is a highly corrosive chemical that can be fatal if inhaled. However, it is not an inhalation hazard unless heated or misted.

CN has not yet disclosed the exact cause of the derailment, as it is currently under investigation.

This is the second derailment in just over two years. The last one, which occurred on March 3, 2017, in downtown Pefferlaw, near Station Rd and Pefferlaw Rd, was considered a major derailment involving 15 cars.

"Any derailment is a cause for concern," said Harding. "The one, two years ago, had powdered copper content in the cars that got derailed. But in front of that was propane and behind that was propane. So we got away lucky on that one. This time the three cars were empty."

# It's heating season, and Project Zero wants you to stay safe this winter

Georgina Fire & Rescue and in Georgina in 2018. Enbridge Gas have partnered for Project Zero, an educational program to improve home safety and bring fire and carbonmonoxide related deaths down to zero.

Georgina Fire & Rescue Services has received 156 combination smoke and carbon monoxide alarms through this program. These alarms will be installed in houses which the fire department finds do not comply with current laws.

"When we respond to a house fire, or we respond to whatever that may be, even a medical call, we always check to make sure there is a working smoke alarm," Fire Chief Ron Jenkins said.

It is usually vulnerable residents, such as seniors, who are not in compliance with the law, Chief Jenkins said. Five per cent of the homes the fire department responds to do not have any smoke alarms, and 14 per cent of the households have out of date alarms or do not have the required one alarm per floor. The fire department recorded 156 carbon monoxide alarm calls

"Nobody thinks they'll have a fire. Nobody thinks that they'll have a CO emergency. Many times the unfortunate part with CO is that it can present (with) flu-like symptoms," Chief Ienkins said.

While responding to a call this past summer, Chief Jenkins said the firefighters, during their workup, noticed a PVC pipe connected to the furnace had cracked.

"The fortunate piece for this outcome was the fact that we were not in the heating season yet," Chief Jenkins said. "During the winter, the broken pipe might not have been observed. There was no carbon monoxide alarm in the home. There's no smell: there's no taste to carbon monoxide. So whether that would have been noticed in time, we don't know."

Carbon monoxide is known as the silent killer because you cannot hear it, see it, smell it or

"We know that the best way to avoid carbon monoxide exposure is to eliminate it at the

source by properly maintaining fuel-burning equipment and that the alarms are a critical second line of defence to protect against carbon monoxide poisoning," Steve McGivery, Director, GTA East Operations, Enbridge Gas Inc., said in a press release.

Just last month in Ottawa, a senior was killed and his wife was in critical condition from carbon monoxide poisoning in their home.

According to the Technical Standards and Safety Authority and the Ontario Fire Marshall, if your home has a fuel-burning appliance, such as a furnace, dryer, water heater, fireplace or stove, or an attached garage, you must install a carbon monoxide alarm adjacent to each sleeping area and on every storey. They also recommend annual inspections for all fuel-burning appliances in your home.




