Public health declares outbreak at Cedarvale Lodge

Cedarvale Lodge in Keswick is in lockdown after an outbreak was declared by York Region Public Health on October 8.

The outbreak, which requires only one positive case, was declared after a staff member at the LTC home tested positive for COVID-19.

The staff member, who last worked on October 3, is currently at home in isolation, according to a spokesperson from Sienna Senior Living, the home's owner.

Following a request from Public Health, all Cedarvale Lodge residents and staff were tested by Cedarvale's nursing staff on October 9. While all results have been negative so far, according to public health, results for most of the tests are still pending.

"There are 44 staff with results pending and two new residents who have been tested due to symptoms. There are 55 residents swabbed and results are pending. The current turnaround time for labs can be up to five days," said Patrick Casey, director of communications for York Region, in an email to The Post on October 11.

"Results will be communicated to residents and families once they are received," said Natalie Gokchenian, director of communications for Sienna Senior Living.

"All residents will remain in their rooms

Marine unit opens in Jackson's Point

York Regional Police (YRP) officially opened its new marine unit headquarters in Jackson's Point on October 5.

The 8,600 sq. ft. facility, located on the former site of Bonnie Boats Marina,

provides office space for nine full-time officers, a training/meeting room, storage space, and three boat slips for police vessels, which include the 38-foot Naawij, the 34-foot Waawaatesi, and a new 24-foot rigid

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

and receive tray service for meals. All staff are donning full PPE for droplet and contact precautions. In addition, we are suspending general family visits and any non-essential resident outings at this time for all residents."

Ms. Gokchenian wants family members to know that staff are implementing public health protocols to contain any possible spread of the virus.

"The team at Cedarvale is doing a tremendous job in managing the situation. They are highly skilled in infection control practices and are working closely with public health to ensure all proper precautions and directives are in place."

Cedarvale Lodge Retirement and Care Community, located at 121 Morton Avenue in Keswick, is a 60-bed, for-profit, long-term care home.

The licensee is registered as The Royale Development LP, which is a wholly-owned limited partnership, controlled by Sienna Senior Living.

While the LTC home, unlike River Glen Haven in Sutton, managed to avoid a COVID-19 outbreak in the spring, it has been the subject of multiple inspections by the Ministry of Long-Term Care.

In 2019, ministry inspectors

conducted eight inspections, including four critical incident inspections and three complaint inspections.

However, this year there has been only one follow-up inspection.

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

hull inflatable Zodiac, which can reach speeds of over 40 knots in shallow water.

The facility also operates in winter, with snowmobiles, allterrain vehicles and a 24-foot custom airboat responding to emergency calls on the ice.

According to YRP, the marine unit's new location will improve efficiency and significantly reduce emergency response times in its patrol area, which includes 350 square kilometers of Lake Simcoe, as well as regional waterways.

Since 2001, the YRP marine unit has moored its vessels at Krates Marina in Keswick, while its officers were based at #3 District Headquarters at 3527 meant that officers frequently had to drive 11 km to their vessels to respond to calls.

"Having officers in a building with a floating boathouse allows a rapid response to anyone that needs help on Lake Simcoe," said Staff Sgt. Aaron Busby, the marine unit's commander, whose team responds to hundreds of calls each year, and so far has saved eight lives on Lake Simcoe this season.

According to Staff Sgt. Busby, the new facility will allow for increased patrols on the lake and shave as much as 10 to 15 minutes off emergency calls.

Const. Zach Goldman, who has served six years with the marine unit, mostly on Lake

Simcoe, agrees the new location may help save lives.

"When we were based at Krate's Marina, and we got a call that was further east on the lake, a lot of times, based on the water level, we might have to go all the way around Georgina Island to get to the Pefferlaw River. Now at least our starting point is midway. So our response time is much improved."

CGIFN Band Councillor and artist Lauri Hoeg. whose paintings are featured prominently on the new building. also believes the new location will improve boater safety, particularly around Georgina Island.

"We've found in recent years Baseline Rd in Sutton -- this when there are people in peril that it's been our people, either our police, ferry boat operators or just local guys who hop in a boat, that have gotten there first, before the police, to rescue people off the water. So I think this will be beneficial for sure."

> "Minutes can be the difference between life and death when you're involved in a situation on the water, particularly in the case of hypothermia," added YRP Chief Jim MacSween, who said YRP had spent more than a decade looking for a suitable location for its marine unit before the region purchased the land in Jackson's Point from MSR Holdings Inc in 2017.

> Chief MacSween also sees the new facility helping YRP with

community outreach and water safety education, and hopes to host an open house for the community once the pandemic is over.

"Right now, we're sticking to what was initially planned, but we're always open to working

with the community, having further conversations," he said.

This is welcome news to Mayor Margaret Quirk.

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New country music station set to launch this month

Country music lovers won't of current charting artists." have to wait much longer, as K Country 93.7 FM is set to launch Country won't just play Top 40 the week of October 26.

The station was initially scheduled to launch over the labour-day weekend, but the pandemic delayed installing the station's 40,000-watt transmitter, which had to be imported from Italy.

Now, with the transmitter up and running on Glenwoods Ave, Ed Torres, President and CEO of Torres Media, says the station is good to go, and he's confident that Georgina will embrace its New Country music format.

"We did an extensive amount of market research after the license was granted. Country and rock were the two favourites. But country was a good 20 per cent above rock. And it's also the hottest growing format in Canada right now," said Mr. Torres, whose company owns three other radio stations, including Rebel 101.7 FM in Ottawa and 105.5 Hits FM in Uxbridge.

"There's also no country station to service the area. So country is the perfect fit from a market point of view. The station is going to be very contemporary. We're going to play Blake Shelton, Gabby Barrett, Luke Bryan, those kinds

But, according to Torres, K country songs. He also sees the station nurturing aspiring local artists.

"If you have anything that's playing on the radio, we will play it. We'll also interview artists onair," said Torres.

"Leah Daniels is a good example, she's from Uxbridge, and she's cracked country radio in Canada. So, we'll be playing any local artists, as long as they've got good quality content.

Torres also says the station will sponsor local music festivals, after the pandemic is over, which is one of its CRTC license requirements.

"We believe that building local roots is very important. With our rock station in Ottawa, we do a band contest with prizes. We also support local artists through music festivals. So some of those ideas we'll be bringing to Georgina."

Coleton MacDonald, Country's morning show host, also sees the station becoming a big part of the community.

"We're going to be very involved with the community, and I think it's going to be a lot

of fun. The morning show is all the bad news. going to be upbeat. And there's going to be a lot of interaction with listeners. So it's going to be a good time."

While both Torres and MacDonald admit launching a radio station during a pandemic hasn't been easy, they're hopeful the station will provide listeners with a welcome distraction from

"But it's nice to have something in the community that's going to put a smile on people's faces every morning. Hopefully, it will give them a little better start to their day. That's what we're looking forward to doing."



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


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SCC renovations complete, but the season is postponed


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
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Scouts raise money through online coffee sales

CLEARING UP SOME COMMON MISCONCEPTIONS ABOUT IMPAIRED DRIVING:

1. It is not an offence to drive while impaired if I am on private property.

Part VIII.1, sections 320.11 to 320.4 of the Criminal Code state the law for impaired driving in Canada. The Criminal Code applies to all of Canada, whether on public or private property. Just as it is a crime to commit an assault or mischief on private property, it is also an offence to drive while impaired in any place in Canada including your own driveway or a parking lot.

2. I was "sleeping it off" and not driving, therefore I am not guilty of an offence.

It is illegal in Canada to both "operate" or have "care and control" of a motor vehicle while impaired by alcohol or drug or a combination thereof (section 320.11 and 320.14 of the Code). If you are found in the driver's seat, you are presumed to be in care and control of the vehicle.

In criminal court, this presumption is rebuttable if you convince a judge you did not operate the driver's seat for the purpose of setting the vehicle in motion. However, even if you are able to overcome this hurdle, a Judge must still find you guilty if you present a "realistic risk of danger" to the public - which often includes: sleeping it off because you could change your mind and drive home at any time.

3. I was not driving a car, and therefore I am not guilty.

The Criminal Code provides that it is an offence to operate a "conveyance" while impaired, which is defined as a motor vehicle, a vessel, an aircraft, or rail equipment. The court have found that this definition includes a: car. boat, canoe, kayak, paddleboat, and even a golf cart.

4. I blew under the legal limit, 80 mg of alcohol / 100 mL of blood, why am I charged with impaired?

It is an offence in Canada to operate a motor vehicle while impaired by alcohol or drug. The courts have found "any degree" of impairment from slight to great" sufficient to constitute the offence.
