

Raw sewage from Ramada contaminates Bonnie Park

According to residents, raw sewage from the Ramada Jackson's Point Resort & Spa has been leaking into Bonnie Park since January.

The source of sewage may be a septic tank used to service the motel wing of the resort.

But Ramada management declined to comment on the matter, referring the Post to the Town for an explanation.

The Town says it confirmed sewage was leaking onto Bonnie Park on July 20, and that the spill was caused by a malfunction in Ramada's plumbing system, which has now been fixed.

However, Paul Brady, who lives across from the park, says he notified the Town of the spill six months ago.

Brady says he first noticed the spill in January when the area remained wet after the rest of the park froze.

He emailed Mayor Margaret Quirk, Ryan Cronsberry, the Town's CAO, and Town staff about the issue, but the Town did not respond.

He says he also emailed Ward 4 Councillor Frank Sebo in March after he warned children not to play in the area, but, again, nothing was done.

After months of inaction, several residents posted their concerns on a group Facebook

page, Friends of Jackson's Point, and at least one resident contacted public health.

Last week, the area was cordoned off with yellow caution tape to keep park users, specifically children, away from the spill.

On July 20, Brady again tried emailing the Mayor, CAO and Town staff, but this time he attached a picture of the spill, which clearly showed human feces, sanitary tissue and a used condom.

After Brady's email, the Town erected a temporary fence around the spill.

"Last week, I went under the caution tape and took a picture of where the sewage is coming out of the ground at the back of the wall," he said.

"I sent the photo to the Town. That's what finally activated this. If I hadn't done that, I'm sure we would still just have the tape."

While the area is now fenced off, there is no signage to warn residents and visitors about the spill or potential health hazards.

The Post approached several people using the park this past weekend, and they were surprised to find out about the spill. They also wondered why signage was not posted.

Brady says a vacuum truck soaked up most of the sewage over the weekend.

But he believes the soil around

the spill is probably contaminated and needs to be either removed or treated.

The Town says its insurer will hire an environmental remediation company to test the soil to determine the extent of the contamination and formulate a clean-up plan if testing deems it necessary.

According to the Town, the insurer will administer the work and decide whether Ramada should bear any cost.

While it appears the Town is now taking action, Brady says it has been a frustrating experience.

"I said to the Mayor in one of my emails; I'll bet this is the first time since the 1930s that a town resident has to write to town officials, begging them to stop sewage coming onto a town park."

How can we do a lot better to improve that huge imbalance? We need to staff, and adequately fund, Economic Development if we are to compete at a high level. Another pot shop or another pizza store are not what I'm talking about. Maybe more remuneration for council members will send a message that we'll pay, but we expect and will demand better performance. If you aren't happy with your accountant or lawyer, you move to a better one. Maybe more compensation for council members will attract new candidates this October who will add quality and depth to the discussion. Let's expect and demand better value for money.

How do we compare with other similar sized municipalities in Key Performance Indicators? Let's find out if we are receiving good value for our money. The information is out there. I am in favour of the increased salary for council, but I'll be watching closely how they perform. This is an important municipal election in October, I hope to see you at the polling place.

nobody forgot about us," said Jason Kay, the fair's president, who promises fun for the whole family.

According to Victoria Pike, one of the fair's directors, dozens of volunteers have been working hard completing repairs, cutting the grass, and painting the fences to get the grounds ready.

"The Sutton Fair and Horse Show has been part of the community for over 160 years due to the efforts of dedicated volunteers. This tradition continues today," said Kevin and Sandra Hutchings, owners of Hutchings Farm in Pefferlaw, who have been volunteering with their four kids.

"Every Wednesday night, volunteers, including their kids, meet at the fairgrounds to get the grounds ready for the fair. We want to instill in them the importance of giving back to the community. It's the only way the fair and many other community events will continue."

Pike said they are thrilled to have the fair back this year, and there are many events to get fairgoers excited.

do not have every year," she said. They'll also run the truck and tractor pull on Thursday evening and the demolition derby on Saturday evening. The midway, the agricultural events and the home craft exhibits are also open during the four days.

"With my two small children, we love visiting the home craft exhibit, there's the kids' corner, there's photography entries, there's baking, there's vegetables, horticultural, and flowers," she said.

Pike said the entries to the different categories would be judged on Thursday morning. So when the fair opens that afternoon, everyone will be able to see how the contestants did.

"Come to the fair; you won't be disappointed," she said.

Advanced adult day passes are available for \$10 each at Sutton and Keswick Home Hardware until August 3, along with midway passes for \$40 each that allow one person to ride all midway rides for one day; passes are not available during the fair.

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Q. What are the legal requirements for a person to make a valid will?

A. To make a valid will, the person making the will (the testator) generally needs to be at least 18 years old, and they must have sufficient mental capacity (testamentary capacity).

Generally, the testator must be 18 or older, but there are exceptions to the age rule. One exception is if the testator is under 18 and a member of the Canadian Forces (either as part of a regular force or active service under the National Defence Act, or is a sailor and at sea or in the course of a voyage), in which case they can still make a valid will. Another exception to the age requirement is if the testator is married or has previously been married. If the underage testator makes a will in the contemplation of marriage to a specific named person, the will becomes valid only when the testator marries that specific person.

After satisfying the age rule or an exception, the next step in creating a valid will is to make sure that the testator has sufficient mental capacity, which is often referred to as testamentary capacity. Having testamentary capacity means that the testator is able to understand what it means to make a will and understands the extent of the property and assets that they own. The person making the will must also be capable of comprehending and appreciating the relationship they have with the person or persons who should receive any part of their estate. The testator must also not be under any delusions that would influence any of their decisions when making a will.

If it is proven that a testator lacked testamentary capacity at the time of giving their instructions for their will and at the time it was signed, then the will may not be valid.

Women's march highlights need for abortion services

The first-ever Georgina March rights. for Women's Rights, which took place on July 9 in Keswick, was in part a show of support for the millions of U.S. women who lost their constitutional right to an abortion after the U.S. Supreme Court overturned its 1973 landmark legal decision, Row v. Wade, on June 24.

But it was also intended to highlight the lack of abortion services in York Region, which forces pregnant women to travel to Toronto or Peel to obtain a legal abortion.

Keswick resident Elena Rinne, a social justice advocate and grade 11 student at Keswick High School, organized the march after watching media reports about the impact of the U.S. Supreme Court decision on women's reproductive rights.

While Rinne had hoped to attract close to a hundred participants, just over a dozen people showed up at the Georgina Ice Palace to demonstrate on Woodbine Ave. Still, they got quite a few honks of support from passing motorists.

Before the march, several speakers shared their personal stories and support for women's

"Many of you may be asking, how does this affect Canada? What does this have to do with me?" Rinne said.

"Last year, 81 of 119 Conservative MPs voted to restrict abortion rights in Canada, and three PC candidates in the last Ontario provincial election said there are "no circumstances" in which a woman should have access to abortion."

Rinne said access to abortion is a huge issue in Canada, as some provinces and territories have only one provider.

Kendra Mullings, former Chair of Georgina's Equity and Diversity Advisory Committee, reiterated that although abortion is legal in Canada, legal does not mean accessible.

"America's decision will reduce access to local and safe abortions here in Canada. And it'll greatly impact wait times at clinics and other services that are already struggling to meet healthcare needs right here in Canada. Not to mention the massive impact on the stigma around abortions," Mullings said.

"As Canadians, we need to advocate for our federal and

provincial governments to help clinics with more funding, to improve access for Canadians. As Canadians, we need to ensure that access to abortion is enshrined into our law so that we are never forced to be in the same situation that pregnant American women are now in."

Madison Oliver, a volunteer with the Women's Support Network of York Region, attended the march with her partner and two children.

Oliver, who volunteers on the women's crisis line, is upset that in York Region, with a population of more than 1.2 million, pregnant women still have to travel to get an abortion.

"We shouldn't have to go to Toronto. And, if that's what's happening in York Region, what's happening in some of the smaller towns in Ontario and across the country? I think the message today is around accessibility in Canada," she said.

While York Region's sexual health clinics provide information about pregnancy options for clients, they do not offer abortion services.

"York Region continues to provide pregnancy testing and options to support our clients who are pregnant, including referral for clients who require abortion services," Lindsay Rosien, a public health nurse and team lead for York Region's sexual health clinics, told the Post.

"We also actively promote and provide contraception and emergency contraception services in our five York Region clinics, which includes the Georgina Sexual Health Clinic, located at the Link in Sutton."

Rinne still holds out hope things may change.

"Even though we are a very small community, we can still make an impact," she said.

And while the turnout for the march was less than she expected, Rinne hopes to continue to educate and bring different perspectives to the issue.

"If a march like this will get somebody to do a Google search or take a picture and try to learn more, then that's a good thing. I hope that more people will learn from today," she said.

Roller Derby rink installed at Ice Palace

The Georgina Roller Derby League (GRDL) has a new permanent roller derby track at the Ice Palace.

Do you want your fiancée to sign a Marriage Contract?

If your upcoming wedding is not stressing you out yet, should you ask your soon to be spouse to sign a Marriage Contract? When planning a bright and romantic future together should you have that non-romantic or even hostile conversation about protecting your assets in case of Divorce?

The Ontario Family Law Act tells us what can be included in a Marriage Contract.

Marriage contracts

52 (1) Two persons who are married to each other or intend to marry may enter into an agreement in which they agree on their respective rights and obligations under the marriage or on separation, on the annulment or dissolution of the marriage or on death, including,

- (a) ownership in or division of property;
- (b) support obligations;
- (c) the right to direct the education and moral training of their children, but not the right to custody of or access to their children; and

(d) any other matter in the settlement of their affairs.

Simply put, a Marriage Contract allows the spouses to determine for themselves what happens if the couple divorces, instead of using the standard property and support formulas.

There are exceptions such as which parent your future children will live with, dealing with the Matrimonial Home, etc.

If you and/or your future spouse have that asset that you want to protect, both future spouses should each hire a lawyer to negotiate a Marriage Contract. If the rules of negotiation and drafting the Marriage Contract are followed, a Court should hold the separating spouses to their previously negotiated agreement if the spouses separate.

You will need more than a simple line of, "What's mine is mine and what's yours is yours."

If you own your own home or want to protect your wealth for yourself and even for your children from a previous relationship, you should be having that unromantic conversation and talk about a Marriage Contract.

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
